


# Streetwise



Last month I embarked on a discussion about change in the institutional Church. I continue that discussion because I do believe that God is again, right now in 2016, changing our institutional Church. Watching how changes have happened in your lifetime and mine may help us to remember and to recognize what is unfolding now. There are always incremental adjustments going on in structures, but in structures of human relationships there are bursts of energy that demand our attention. If we love God, and if we love the institution of the Episcopal Church, and if we love our life in our Christ Church parish community, that burst of energy forces us to deal. Hmmm. Maybe that means the Holy Spirit is here, now, leading us forth towards change.

I matriculated at St. Margaret's house to be eligible to enroll in seminary studies at Church Divinity School of the Pacific (CDSP). In hindsight it is evident to me that at that time, 1961-1963, I was participating directly in God's changing the history of our beloved Church.

I studied at CDSP when The Rev. Dr. Massey Shepherd, who had been appointed by General Convention to lead the revision of the 1928 *Book of Common Prayer*, was up to his knees in the process of comprehending responses of the Church to the trial use of the proposed *BCP*. Of course he was not doing this alone. He was heading a consultative group of liturgical leaders. But as our professor, he was thinking aloud and requiring responses from all of his students regarding the integrity of what is now familiar to us and cherished--the 1979 *BCP*. In my first two semesters, Shep encouraged us to study the New Testament and Early Church History side-by-side as a single context. He was especially concerned for us women, that we be able to identify through our eyes not only traditional masculine views, but also the roles and contributions of women in the New Testament and early church. As a 23 year old who barely knew what it meant to be a grown woman, I found great strength through Shep's approach.

I was always in trouble at St. Margaret's. I asked the wrong questions and spoke from the wrong perspectives. I was told, "We don't teach that here." Shep offered himself as a mentor to me. At one of my many times of great discouragement regarding Christian Education, Shep handed me a penciled draft of The Ordination for Deacons. "This is for you." I did not realize until I was well into my recent diaconal formation that I had been asking deacon's questions, and that is the reason I was such a misfit at St. Margaret's. Years later, I received a letter of apology from Dean Katherine Grammar. She told me that after Selma she understood the message in my heart and was sorry to have been insensitive and unaware.

Shep also taught us Liturgics. We came to understand within ourselves that the deepest change in our current *BCP* is that through anamnesis we enter into the very presence of the Living God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. This understanding was powerful enough to change the practice of the institutional Church. Sunday Eucharist became and still is the principle service of The Episcopal Church. Are you troubled by the primacy of Eucharist? Would you prefer the primacy of Morning Prayer with Holy Communion once or twice a month? Are you satisfied saying that God changed the Episcopal Church as an institution? Some clergy and laity have left The Episcopal Church to form counter-Churches conforming to earlier or other visions.

## What's a Vestry?

From the Episcopal Church Canons—"Except as provided by the law of the State or of the Diocese, the Vestry shall be agents and legal representatives of the Parish in all matters concerning its corporate property and the relations of the Parish to its Clergy."



That's sort of a basic, minimalist description. The website goes on to say that there are lots of variations. Once upon a time (at least 20 years ago) the church's Canons described Vestries and their composition in some detail—5-15 members, either elected for life or with a three-year rotating membership. They have since dropped all such description, except to say that the composition "...shall be such as the State or Diocesan law may permit or require..." Regardless, most Vestries have always consisted of 12 members (remember, 12 tribes, 12 apostles, etc.) on a three year rotating basis. Some few vestries have less than 12, typically small parishes. Normally, missions do not have a Vestry unless appointed by the Bishop.

That means we elect four (more if there is a vacancy) a year at the Annual Meeting. Vacancies are either filled by Vestry choice or left empty till the next Annual Meeting. We will be electing four and we have (at the time I write this) five candidates—Sue Furman, Jen Brickel, Eddie Ofodile, Georgine Takach, and Donna Yanavalage.

To be a Vestry member you must a) be at least 17, b) be a baptized and confirmed **lay** member of Christ Church, c) not an employee of the parish, and d) not a member of the household of a current Vestry member or candidate.

It's interesting to note that, while you must be a member here, you don't have to be confirmed to be elected, although you have to be confirmed to actually be installed. We have, on occasion, had to rush someone through Confirmation at the last second.

Being a Vestry member means that you will be connected to one or more ministries of the church. It does **not** mean that you will do that ministry, although often that's the case. Your job on the Vestry is to coordinate with and support that ministry. Participating in it is a separate question—you may par-

ticipate to any level you choose.

Members are restricted to one three-year term at a time, although Wardens are allowed to be reelected once.

Most dioceses have either Senior and Junior Wardens, or Rector's and People's Wardens. This diocese is the only one, as far as I can tell, that has Accounting Wardens. Last year we separated the Accounting Warden position from Vestry membership and extended the term to six year because of the technical and knowledge requirements of the position. As this Warden no longer had to be a Vestry member, we added the position of People's Warden, so we now have three Wardens, two of whom must concurrently be Vestry members.

Wardens must be 21 years old rather than 17 to meet the PA requirements for signing valid contracts.

An additional, and very significant duty of the Vestry is the election of a Rector, Priest-in-Charge, or interim. The search for a Rector /P-i-C is typically (but not always) delegated to a separate Search or Discernment Committee, but it is the Vestry's duty to make the election.

How do you become a Vestry member? Legally, you just get nominated and then elected at an Annual Meeting. In practice we have a nominating committee, traditionally consisting of the outgoing members, but actually consisting of all of the, Vestry, our secretary, Erma, and anyone else who helps.

By Canon law, the Rector (or Priest-in-Charge) presides at meetings (unless they delegate to a Vestry member) but is not a member and can only vote to break ties. In the absence of the Rector, the Rector's Warden presides.

The Vestry is approximately equivalent to the Board of Directors of a corporation or business. Christ Church is a Pennsylvania Corporation (from 1826). Interestingly, the Diocese of PA is **not** incorporated, although we appear to be moving in that direction.

## AA Meets At Christ Church

Alcoholics Anonymous is a world-wide fellowship of men and women who share the common bond of struggles with addiction to alcohol. Our goal is to stay sober one day at a time by adherence to our program of 12 steps and 12 traditions. We carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers through frequent meetings and sponsorship. Due to the nature of this disease, the alcoholic must hit bottom in order to become willing to let God enter and expel the merciless obsession. This painful process requires the support of others. Experience has shown that no one recovers through their own resources. For this reason we in recovery depend upon our higher power and the mutual support of fellow alcoholics. We must give this program away in order to keep it.



Most AA meetings last one hour and are held at the same time and place each day or week. AA is an anonymous program; who is seen and what is discussed should not leave the room. Anonymity is the foundation of all our traditions, placing principals before personalities. There are two formats for meetings either a speaker shares his or her story or a group discussion is held limiting speakers to no more than five minutes each. Meetings can be open where the community is invited to participate or closed where only those with a desire to stop drinking are admitted. Discussion topics include readings from AA sanctioned publications, individual steps and traditions, or living and coping issues at the discretion of the meeting chairperson.

The weekly meeting held 7 p.m. Thursday night at Christ Church, Pottstown, is an open speaker meeting featuring one speaker who shares his or her story for most of the hour. Attendance has averaged about 50 people. A free will donation of \$1.00 per person helps defray the cost of the meeting and free coffee. Parking is utilized although many attendees walk. Our downtown location seems convenient for most. AA thanks Christ Church for the use of the hall and parking lot as we seek to have God return us to sanity.
