## Caritas / Agape

The famous passage of I Corinthians 13 focuses on the an attitude called *agape* in the original Greek, *caritas* in Latin.

St. Paul holds is up as the absolute essence of God's attitude towards us, and, if we are to be in the image of God, absolutely essential for us.

It's been noted that *agape/caritas* is used two ways in the N.T. - vertically to indicate the relationship between God and us, and horizontally to indicate the relationships among us.

In the King James version it is translated as "charity." Throughout the Bible, in both Testaments, charity is absolutely mandated. The Torah has detailed descriptions on how to harvest grain sloppily so some would be left for the poor. Incidentally, in most places the KJV translation for *agape* is *love*. It is *charity* here to specify the horizontal relationship.

Unfortunately, language evolves, and over the years charity came to have other meanings implying some element of mere mechanical action and condescension. Consider the many places that we get asked for donations, from the bell-ringing Santa to the plastic box by each cash register at Wawa. It has come to have a meaning of action detached from connection. Use of *charity* today screens out the inclusion of connection and feeling.

Equally unfortunately, the meaning of "love" has evolved. The terms "Hollywood" and "TV" say it all. Love is now absolutely equated to sex or to trivia (I love ice cream) in popular culture, making the modern translations at least as problematic as the King James one. Use of the word love in this Biblical context screens out the subtleties of God, non-sexual human affection, selflessness, and well-being of others.

And, unfortunately yet again, I am unable to find any other English word that makes for a really accurate translation. I found *affection, altruism, benevolence, benignity, bountifulness, clemency, generosity, goodness, goodwill, humaneness, kindness, love, magnanimity, mercy,*



*tenderheartedness* - none of them quite work.

Which leads me to a part of our mission at Christ Church. A couple of years ago we were given a large (by Christ Church standards) bequest with no strings attached. We did not immediately act on it, mostly because it had to go through a fairly lengthy legal process before the funds were distributed, and then came to us in several pieces.

We've had an ongoing discussion in the Vestry and in congregational meetings on what we should do with this gift.

The Vestry has made two major policy decisions on it. The first was to allocate the funds to particular areas: on the original estimate of \$1,300,000 we would allocate \$500,000 to mission (38.46%), \$400,000 to property (30.77%), and \$400,000 (30.77%) to be held and invested. The actual amount, with interest, etc. was a bit more, but don't really affect our actions.

In addition, it was proposed that we give a *tithe* from the bequest as a thank offering. A few months ago, after discussion in congregational meetings, the Vestry voted to do just that. We are giving away approximately \$130,000 to needs outside the parish, with no strings attached, the same way the bequest came to us.

This will not be done overnight. Any gift from this tithe has been, or will be, discussed and evaluated. The main criteria have come to be a) there are no strings attached, and b) the recipient is not a part of our regular parish mission.

Thus far we have given out three pieces of the tithe. The first was triggered by the tower collapse at 1st Baptist Church. After considerable discussion we gave them \$50,000 to get the repair and reconstruction work started. (We also loaned them \$40,000, but that is not a part of the tithe as we expect to eventually be repaid.)

Following that, we have given \$15,000 to the Seaman's Church Institute and \$10,000 to Ministries at Main St. We still have a ways to go.

Feeling thankful and not expressing it is like wrapping a present and not giving it.

## Search Committee

In the past several weeks the committee completed our working job description for a right Rector and presented it to the Vestry. It is most important to note that this is our working document and not confuse it with an official job description which will be negotiated by our new Rector and the Vestry.

We use this document to assist us in setting criteria for a first sort of resumes received and formulate interview questions. In order to assure ourselves that we and the Vestry are in agreement regarding our Rector hopes and needs, we reviewed this with the Vestry, asking only that they tell us if we are on the right path; not that they re-write or approve each line. They overwhelmingly agreed we are going in the right direction and affirmed that God must be leading us.

Here is our working document:

### **Position Description: Rector Christ Episcopal Church Pottstown, Pennsylvania**

The Rector is the spiritual leader, principal minister of the sacraments, pastor and chief executive officer of the parish, with responsibilities and functions traditionally associated with the office, set forth in the canons of the church and further interpreted here.

**Organizational relationships:** The rector reports to the Bishop and the Vestry and in accordance with the canons, bears certain authorities of the office and accountability to the Bishop as chief pastor. S/he supervises directly or indirectly all employed staff and volunteer ministers, is ex officio a member of every parish organization and may appoint individuals or groups to specific responsibilities as deemed needed or desired.

#### **Specific areas of accountability:**

##### **Corporate Worship**

- Conduct worship services in a dignified and reverent manner
- Present the liturgy in a way that is accessible to

all, including newcomers

- Guide those assisting in the service so that they are able to fulfill their functions smoothly and contribute to the reverence of the service
- Preach using the lectionary readings in ways that help us understand the meaning and apply it to our daily lives
- Include and educate the parish when liturgical changes are considered

#### **Pastoral Care**

- Acknowledge a primary responsibility to our parish needs and recognize Christ Church parishioners as your first flock
- Promote coordination among our ministries of congregational care and share with those groups your knowledge of special needs of members whenever appropriate
- Visit our sick and homebound
- Establish office hours when you are available to meet with parishioners
- Engage in fellowship opportunities with church members, attend Parish-wide functions when possible
- Become aware of the needs of individual parishioners; strive to learn their names

#### **Outreach**

- Model concern and care for the needs of the world
- Support and assist the parish in the development of ministries of service to the wider community
- Help us to regularly evaluate our existing ministries of service
- Participate in the life and ministry of the Diocese of PA
  - • Model the hospitality of Christ by welcoming all people into the parish

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- Work cooperatively with other clergy and ministries in the area to serve our Pottstown community

### Christian Education

- Teach the Gospel of Jesus Christ by word and by the example of study and prayer
- Oversee Spiritual Formation in the parish, including programs for youth and adults
- Empower and encourage lay teachers and leaders
- Oversee preparation for baptism, confirmation, reaffirmation and reception
- Develop additional educational opportunities as appropriate in collaboration with the Vestry and lay leaders
- Inform the Parish about Diocesan and other opportunities for continuing education and encourage participation
- Participate in programs and retreats for personal growth and development

### Administration

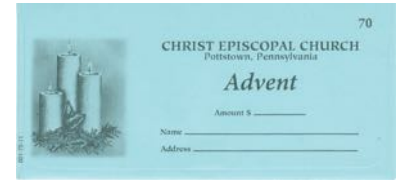
- Oversee parish administration and church staff.
- Encourage and support lay leadership
- Prepare for and chair Vestry meetings
- Support the Vestry in their leadership of the parish
- Manage personal time and energy, including regular days off and vacation.

## Advent Envelopes



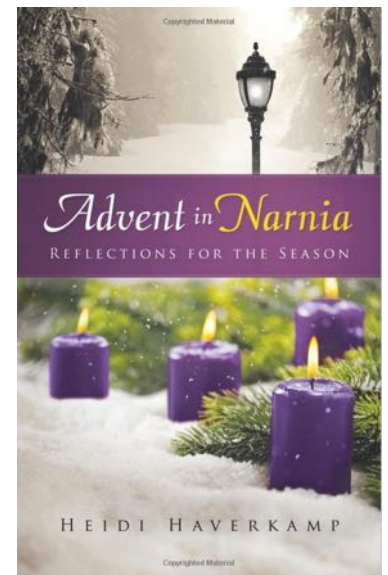
In your box of giving envelopes you will find, towards the back, 4 blue envelopes marked Advent. They take the place of the Advent folders and mite boxes we have used in the past.

## Our Gang

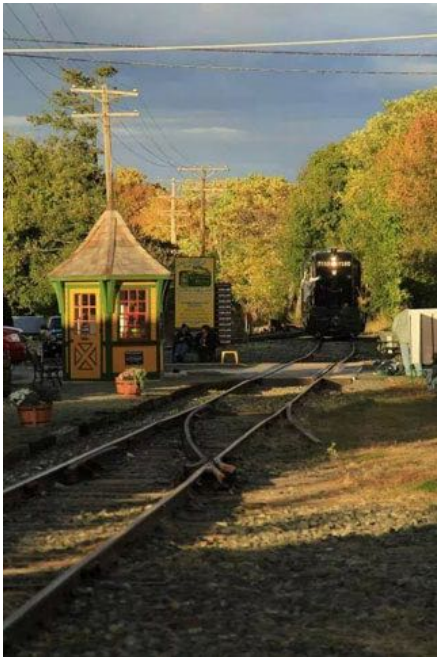

# Music Program

This fall we began a music program for neighborhood children, run by Phyllis Mitchell. She teaches children rhythm, to play recorders, to sing, and to play other instruments. It was recently featured in the Mercury, and the following is an excerpt from that article.



*In addition to her private lessons, Mitchell also teaches for a free children's music program in Pottstown. The free program is offered every Tuesday from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the Christ Episcopal Church. During the one-hour activity, the kids sing, learn about rhythm and play different instruments. Mitchell said the kids are using fun, hands-on instruments like the recorder and color-coded percussion tubes called boomwhackers.*

*Mitchell has worked with students that have emotional issues and children with special needs. She said music is something that can be enjoyed by everyone and all ages.*

*"I think music can be an answer to really every walk of life," she said.*

*Eddie Shean-Hammond, director of education at Christ Episcopal Church, said the music class helps give the children a sense of pride and accomplishment. She said the kids are more focused and the sounds being played have a calming effect on them.*

*"It creates a filter," she said adding that it helps the children to sort out emotions going on inside of them.*
